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# **LESSON PLAN**

# **Spending Money**

GRADES
4 to 5

TIME
45 minutes



## OVERVIEW

We all have to make choices about how to spend our money. This lesson introduces students to the various priorities and pressures that can influence spending decisions. Students will get a chance to practice their budgeting skills and exercise their own spending preferences and trade-offs.

#### GOALS

- Demonstrate how people differ in their needs, their wants and their spending
- Help students identify factors that may influence their own spending
- Introduce students to the concept of opportunity cost

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- Differentiate wants from needs
- Identify peer pressure and advertising as factors that can influence spending
- Practice prioritizing spending decisions with a budgeting simulation
- Define budget as a plan for spending and saving your money

#### ASSESSMENT

An optional quiz has been provided with this lesson plan (the quiz is not factored into the lesson's 45-minute runtime).

**Did you know?** The word "budget" may have started out as a nickname for a wallet! The word comes from the French word "bougette," meaning small leather pouch.

# **Spending Money**

#### TIMELINE

5 minutes Intro and show VIDEO JR2

### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Introduce the topic: "Who here wishes they had unlimited money? Me, too! Unfortunately, none of us do. That means we have to make choices about how to spend our money. Those choices can look very different, depending on the needs and wants of the person making them."
- 2. Show VIDEO JR2
- 3. Go over PRESENTATION JR2
  - Pause at the "Needs and Wants" section (slides 6–7) and ask the class to share their own examples of needs and wants
  - After the "What is a budget?" section (slides 15-17), mention that students will get to practice using a budget during today's activity
- 4. Facilitate the **ACTIVITY** 
  - Distribute a birthday party budget to each student and explain that their goal is to plan a party with a budget of \$250
  - Share the price lists with the class, either by distributing printed copies or by displaying a digital version
  - Allow time for students to work on the activity

- Use the questions provided in the answer key to guide a discussion about the students' experience with the budgeting activity
- 5. Wrap up by sharing the following:
  - Spending money on one thing often means giving up the opportunity to spend it on something else
  - A budget is a plan for spending and saving our money; it can help us make choices that reflect our wants and needs
  - Everyone has unique wants and needs that shape the choices they make
  - Spending choices can also be influenced by peer pressure and advertising
- 6. (Optional) Distribute **QUIZ** for individual assessment.
- 7. (Optional) Distribute copies of **COMIC JR2** and **ACTIVITY SHEET JR2** for students to take home.






